I am sure most of you have heard the term "Circle of Friends". The diagram below was taught to me as a guide on how to think of your friends and connections. I feel it has a lot to offer when considering your friendship. It may help you identify where your current friends are, where you would like them to be or where you would like to see more friends at.

The inner most circle is your closets friends (usually only one, two or three in your life). They are the ones you want to spend the most time with or they are the ones who would be the first there to help in any crisis, the first people you would call; they are the ones you treasure the most. These are the people that can spend a long time apart however when you see each other it feels like you have spoken every day. You may not have any of these yet which is fine, these friendships develop over a long time and are truly time tested. They would be your maid of honor at your wedding.

The next circle are close friends you spend time with regularly, there is usually more of these friends (maybe around five to ten) you may see them often and hang out with them weekly or monthly, have dinner, play sports. These people would attend your wedding and may be in the bridal party.
